



OGUN poses an end to isolated solutions

The Centre for Information Processing and Information Technology (ZIVIT) developed the internet portal OGUN (Open Government Unifying Nexus) to facilitate the access to independently grown processes. With OGUN, isolated solutions with heterogeneous file formats can now be presented homogeneously.

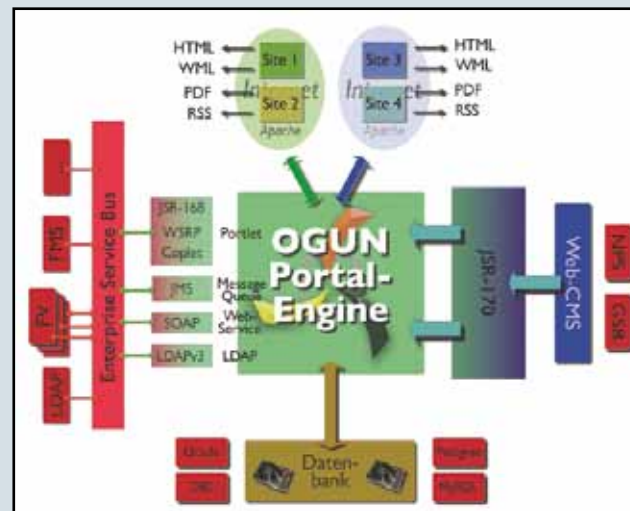
OGUN permits unlimited information exchange

The portal guarantees the information exchange beyond the boundaries of departments and processes. It does so by simplifying the publishing possibilities and by integrating external as well as internal data sources. Additionally, the portal is capable to channel the escalating amounts of data and information.

OGUN adjusts to user requirements

OGUN merges all relevant documents, services and news from different sources and visualises them in one single place, the “single point of access”. Within preset parameters, the user can personalize this visualisation by adapting it to his preferences and requirements. On top of that, he can use all processes for which he is authorised (“single-sign-on”) by having successfully registered only once.

Through the integration of existing processes, OGUN also offers a high degree of investment protection.

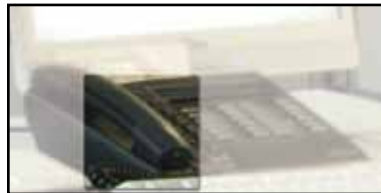


OGUN memorises changes

The product’s core is the integrated management of users and rights and the possibility of personalisation.

The information itself is displayed via portlets, which can be changed – dislocated, altered in size or edited – by the user. The changes are memorised and will be displayed at the subsequent visit.

OGUN is capable to supply different sites with different layout, content and behaviour. The connection to web content management systems is carried out by an xml-based connector, which already exists for the Infopark NPS and for the Government Site Builder.



Flexible connection to other systems

OGUN flexibly connects itself to already existing systems and can, for instance, be adapted to existing directory services like openLDAP. Furthermore, OGUN supports more than 30 databases. The product's output is flexible too, supplying in different formats, such as HTML, WML for mobile devices, aggregated RSS feeds and PDF print editions. Employing suitable components, OGUN enhances security and transparency and noticeably reduces operating expenses.
